As we complete 18 years of Synergy Sansthan's impactful journey, I am filled with gratitude and pride. This year marks not only a milestone but also the beginning of a new trajectory.

In the past year, we initiated work on our strategic plan for the next five years (2023-27). This plan focuses on youth-centric development, scaling successful programs to the state level, and becoming a reference point for community-based and context-driven youth-centered initiatives.

Scaling Impact: Our programs have reached new heights, thanks to the dedication of our team and collaborative efforts with partner organizations. We've expanded our footprint from 2 youth resource centers to 10, and from 20 Udaan Fellows to 50.

Capacity Building: Our internal capacity has grown stronger. We've engaged in capacity-building programs with partner NGOs, research institutions, and youth-led initiatives.

Monitoring and Evaluation: We've partnered with Genpact and Piramal Foundation to develop a robust monitoring and evaluation system. This will enhance evidence-based decision-making and impact assessment.

Policy and Advocacy: Strengthening our HR policies and salary benchmarking processes has been a priority. We've also engaged in civic education and active citizenship through our flagship fellowship program, "Jan Pratham."

This annual report sheds light on the challenges, aspirations, and tireless efforts of our young change-makers.

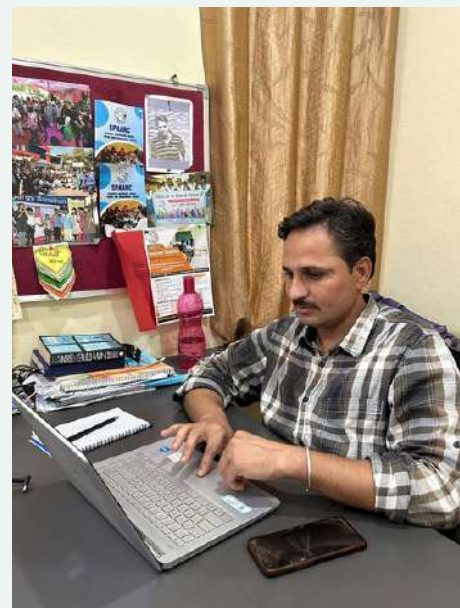

Synergy Sansthan

Founded in 2006, Synergy Sansthan is a community-based, youth-led non-profit organization. It was conceived by three young motivated people who advocate for a youth-centric approach to adolescents, youth development, and empowerment. Since 2006, Synergy Sansthan has focused its efforts in Harda district of Madhya Pradesh.

The co-founders of Synergy Sansthan themselves come from rural families. Each of them faced several challenges in achieving meaningful success at almost every stage of their lives. Owing to the lack of valuable support systems, they all struggled very hard in order to compete with peers from more privileged backgrounds.

Coming together, they thus resolved to establish an organization that could support Children & Youth from Rural & marginalized backgrounds in developing their individual capacities. Over the years of experience with the community, the organization has gathered valuable knowledge about the challenges, requirements, and opportunities of the working area.

The population of Harda is about 5,71,000 scattered into small communities in different villages. There are 571 villages — about 150 villagare located in forest areas, and 45 are forest villages. Synergy Sansthan's direct intervention districts in Madhya Pradesh are- Harda, Khandwa, Khargone, Barwani, Dewas and Betul.

PROBLEM STATEMENT

India, with 27.2% of its population aged 15-29 years, has one of the youngest populations globally, presenting a significant demographic dividend. Madhya Pradesh, characterized by its vast geographical diversity and high tribal population, mirrors this trend with 27.7% of its population under 30 years. Despite this potential, the state faces significant challenges in harnessing the capabilities of its youth due to disparities in access to education, skills development, and essential amenities such as electricity, safe drinking water, and housing. Marginalized communities, including Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, and Muslim minorities, as well as women, face heightened vulnerabilities and social exclusion.

THEORY OF CHANGE

PROBLEM

Increasing gender disparity in the areas of health, education, livelihood, and decision-making; Inflation is rising, the unemployment level still remains high amongst the youth, there is a lack of requisite skills, and most youths are in the informal sector with an unstable income generation; Youth doesn't have access to as basic as electricity, safe drinking water, housing and toilet facility, communication, information, and technology lack of social inclusivity in marginalized sections.

INPUT

Synergy Sansthan programmes focus on providing a safe space for youth to realize their full potential, build their capacities (YRC); It provides financial assistance to adolescents and youth through fellowships; Promote and advocate youth concerns by mobilizing youth development as collectives.

OUR PROGRAMS

YUVAALAY

Yuvalaya is a Action-first platform which intends to foster youth leadership in marginalized rural communities through a youth-centric approach

Marginalized rural, tribal, and semi-urban communities in India face numerous challenges due to social, political, and economic conditions, making them particularly vulnerable. Youth from these communities often lack resources, information, and exposure. As many are first-time learners, they lack adequate guidance and support systems, limiting their ability to utilize existing schemes and policies for their development. Social discrimination further undermines their self-confidence and self-esteem, restricting their capacity to address their problems effectively. It is essential for these youth to access platforms that enable them to overcome these challenges and play a fundamental role in leading social change within their communities.

The YRC Program operates through Youth Resource Centres, which are safe and inclusive spaces for deep self-exploration, experiential learning, and leadership-based social change. These centres offer a range of activities and resources aimed at fostering youth development and community engagement.

By adopting a youth-centric approach, the YRC Program ensures that the needs and aspirations of adolescents and young people are central to the design and development of all interventions. The program also works with other stakeholders to promote child- and youth-centric policies and decisions, creating a supportive ecosystem for youth empowerment.

Over the past sixteen years, Synergy Sansthan has successfully engaged adolescents and youth in Harda district, Madhya Pradesh, and is committed to building on this experience to realize the full potential of its work in the region.

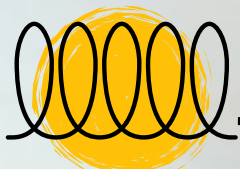

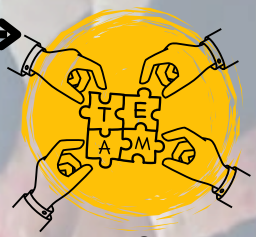

IMPACT STORY

Meet Kavita Chandewa, a young girl from Khedipura in Harda district, Madhya Pradesh. Coming from a modest middle-class family, Kavita's household includes her hardworking father, who is a laborer, her mother who works as an assistant at an Anganwadi center, and her two brothers who juggle their studies and assisting their father. Kavita is pursuing a B.Com degree at Swami Vivekananda Government College.

Despite her dedication to her studies, Kavita's dreams were vague, and she struggled to find her path. She found it challenging to express herself in groups, make new friends, or even voice her opinions at home. This all changed when she met Shivani Ghaghere from Synergy Institute, who introduced her to the Yuvalaya program. Through Yuvalaya, Kavita discovered a space where no one judges and everyone is encouraged to learn and grow.

Her active participation in community activities and workshops helped her gain confidence and leadership skills. Kavita began to express herself more freely in small group sessions and took on leadership roles among the youth in her community, inspiring others to join Yuvalaya.

Kavita's journey of self-discovery was further enriched when she was selected for a 5-day group excursion as part of the Yuvalaya process. This experience motivated her to tackle the social issue of gender discrimination through an action project, marking a significant transformation in her. She began to challenge societal norms and gained the confidence to speak up in larger groups, ultimately realizing her dream of becoming a teacher.

An internship through Yuvalaya further boosted her confidence, enabling her to travel independently. Her family's perception of her changed; they began to understand and support her aspirations. Kavita can now confidently express herself in front of large groups of 150-200 people, and her journey has inspired community leaders and members to encourage more youth to join Yuvalaya.

Kavita's story is a testament to the transformative power of support and opportunity. Her journey from a shy girl to a confident leader and aspiring teacher demonstrates the profound impact of the Yuvalaya program. Her success has not only changed her life but also inspired her community to embrace positive change.



UDAAN

The Udaan fellowship initiated in 2014, addresses severe gender discrimination women face in tribal and rural India. By empowering young women through leadership development, the program fosters self-awareness, social identity, and personal aspirations. Fellows become role models, implementing social action projects and inspiring others in their communities to challenge societal norms and pursue their dreams. Udaan Fellowship is a two-year-long immersive journey for adolescents, young girls, and women (16-21 years old).

Synergy Udaan fellows use a leadership development strategy with young women or girls around their age. We believe it's fundamental to strengthen the fellows' roots by broadening their awareness of themselves – their individuality and social identity, strengths and limitations, fears and aspirations, rights, and social and cultural surroundings.

In the second phase of the strategy, fellows broaden their horizons by expanding their potential areas, becoming role models for other young people in their communities, and facilitating similar journeys for other young women. Fellows participate in developing and implementing a social action project in their communities to accomplish this.

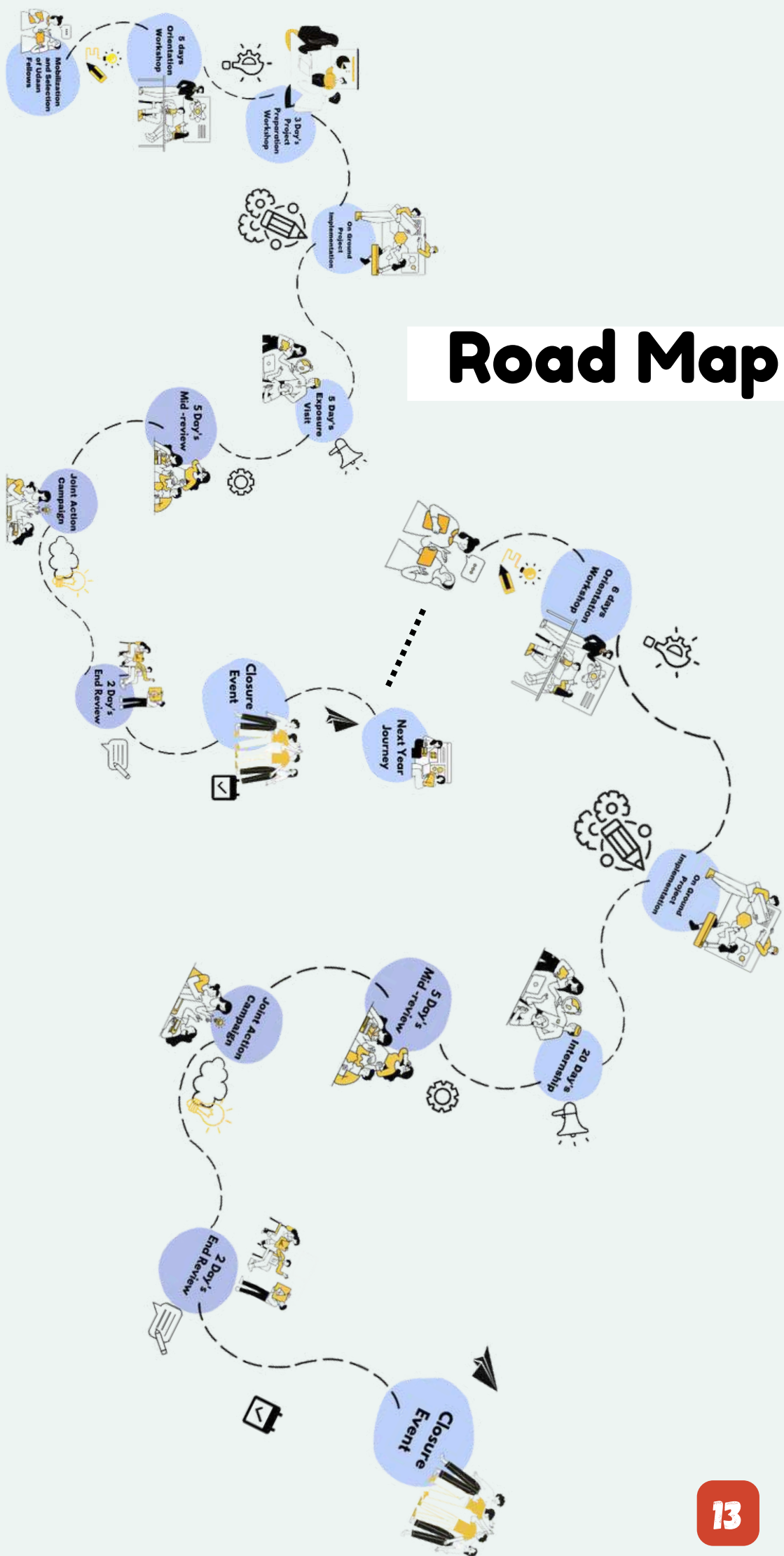

In Madhya Pradesh, youth face significant barriers such as gender and caste disparities, poverty, and limited empowering spaces, with few CSOs addressing these issues. Despite the growth of social entrepreneurship, young change-makers struggle with scaling, networking, and fundraising. The Synergy Udaan program nurtures marginalized youth, providing them with leadership opportunities and support to overcome these challenges, drive social transformation, and sustain their passion and innovative spirit.

The Humrahi Program empowers young non-profit organizations (NPOs) in rural and tribal Madhya Pradesh to lead transformative youth-centric initiatives. Over 24 months, participating NPOs receive intensive training, mentorship, and group exposure, focusing on adolescent and youth development, leadership building, organizational strategy, and fundraising. This journey equips grassroots organizations to become champions of youth empowerment, driving impactful change in their communities. Support Humrahi to invest in the future leaders of rural and tribal India and create a lasting legacy of development and opportunity.

JAN PRATHAM FELLOWSHIP

The journey of inclusive youth leadership development

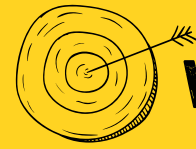
During the Indian struggle for independence and the framing of the Constitution, we dreamt of a democratic India that ensures justice, liberty, equality, and fraternity for all its citizens. Even now, the global narrative recognizes India as the world's largest democracy. However, the reality today is far from that dream and narrative.

India is ranked 46th out of 167 countries in the Global Democracy Index (2022 Report). The Democracy Index of the Economist Intelligence Unit (2021) classifies India as a "flawed democracy." The World Report (2022) by the American non-profit organization Freedom House classifies India as "partly free," with a Global Freedom Score (GFS) of 66/100. Additionally, India scores 2/4 in laws, policies, and practices that guarantee equal treatment to different sections of the population.

These data points indicate that our political and economic systems and structures are becoming non-democratic, non-inclusive, and hierarchical. This trend is also reflected in our education system and family structures. We believe the root cause of the 54% dropout rate by grade 8 and 62% by grade 10 in the area we work in is a non-democratic education system. Consequently, this has resulted in a literacy rate of 50% in Harda.

Adolescents and youth from marginalized and vulnerable communities face limited opportunities for learning, self-development, and leadership. They encounter challenges due to a lack of resources, information, exposure, and social discrimination. Such children and youth should have access to platforms that enable them to develop life skills and leadership abilities, overcome their fears, and discover their true potential. If marginalized youth become empowered, they can lead social change on a large scale.

The Jan Pratham Fellowship, run by Synergy Sansthan in Harda (MP), is a two-year journey of inclusive youth leadership development. This fellowship provides an opportunity for youth who wish to contribute as facilitators for adolescents from underprivileged communities. In this fellowship, 10 fellows selected from Harda and Khandwa districts of Madhya Pradesh will teach children in grades 6-10 about civic education, constitutional values, and life skills through sports and activity-based sessions, aiming to develop the children's leadership abilities.

TESTIMONIAL

My name is Archana Gaur, and I reside in Mahendragoon, Harda district of Madhya Pradesh. I am pursuing an MSc with the aspiration of achieving self-reliance and securing a good position. Currently, I am a fellow in the Jan Pratham Fellowship at Synergy Sansthan, where I teach constitutional values, civic education, and life skills to the students in 9th and 10th grades at the government high school in the village through activity-based sessions.

Initially, when I started going to the school, the children were a bit hesitant, didn't speak much, and showed lack of interest in the sessions. They treated me like a traditional teacher, and initially, I found it challenging to engage them. However, as I continued conducting the sessions, all the children became actively involved, treating me more like a friend than a teacher. The school principal and other teachers also lend their support to my efforts.

From my experience in this fellowship, I have learned that awareness of constitutional values is essential for fostering active citizenship in life.



SBI SANJEEVANI – CLINIC ON WHEELS

"SBI Sanjeevani-Clinic on Wheel" project: a transformative initiative by the SBI Foundation in collaboration with the Synergy Institute. This pioneering effort aims to address healthcare challenges in Khargone district, Madhya Pradesh, particularly among tribal communities in remote areas. By deploying Mobile Medical Units (MMUs) to 40 underserved villages in the Jhirniya block, the project seeks to improve health outcomes and socio-economic well-being. This initiative aligns with India's CSR goals, aiming to empower disadvantaged populations and enhance access to essential healthcare services, thereby fostering a healthier and more resilient community. Building on its success, the project is expanding to three additional districts, extending its impact across a broader region.

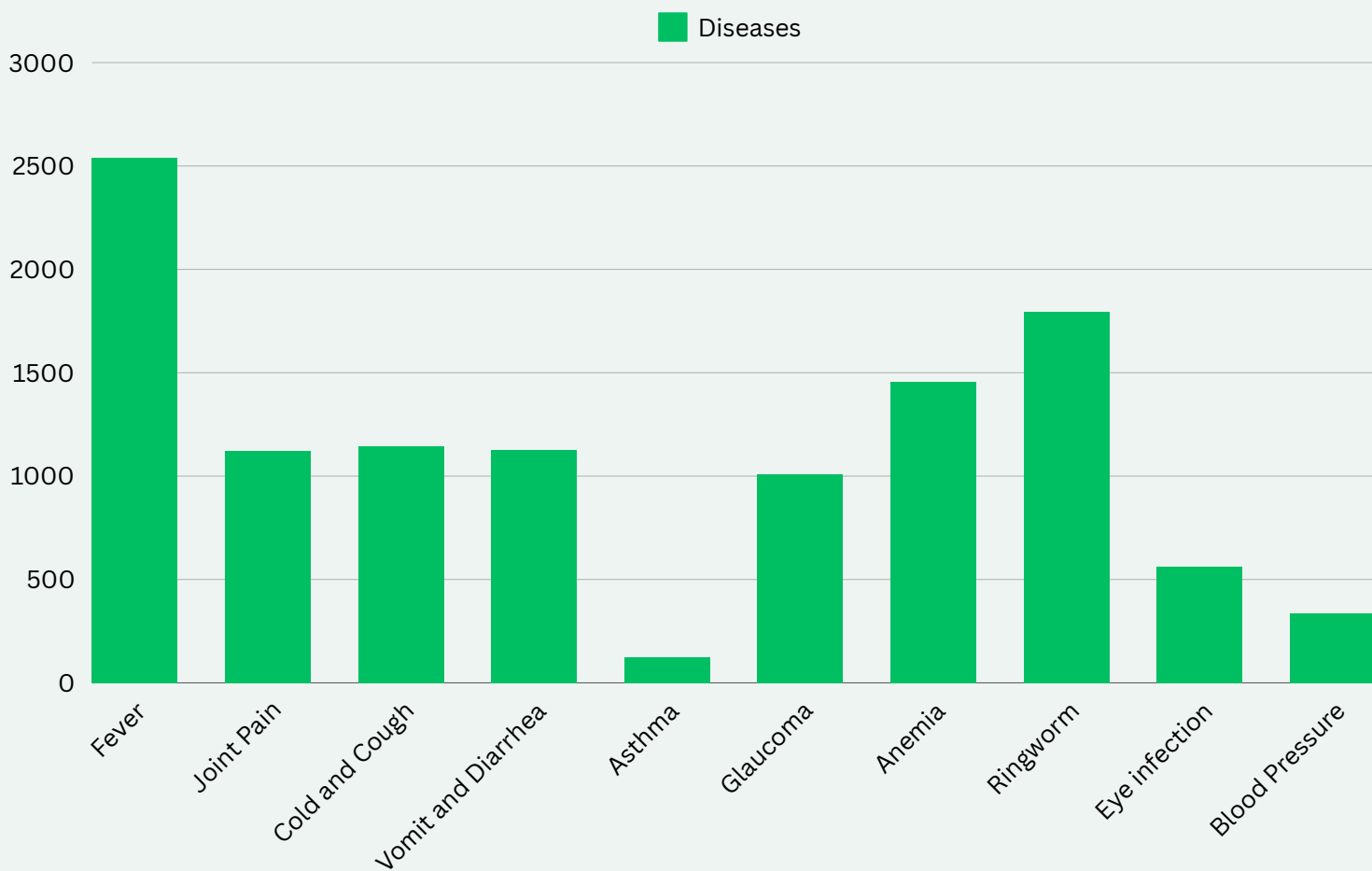

ADOLESCENTS HEALTH PROGRAM

Madhya Pradesh, India, is home to over 50 indigenous tribes living in forested areas with limited resources and facing severe malnutrition and anemia. This is where the CRY project, led by Synergy Institute and CRYUK, focuses on addressing and tackling health and nutritional issues. The Child and Maternal Health Program operates in ten tribal villages in Timarni block of Harda district, with a total population of 7,331, including 1,468 children. The main challenges include food scarcity, poor sanitation, and inadequate healthcare, leading to high child and maternal mortality rates.

ARC program is designed to tackle the pressing issues through targeted interventions in education, health, and gender sensitization. By addressing the root causes and engaging community institutions, the project creates a more inclusive and equitable environment for the tribal populations of Timarni Block.
