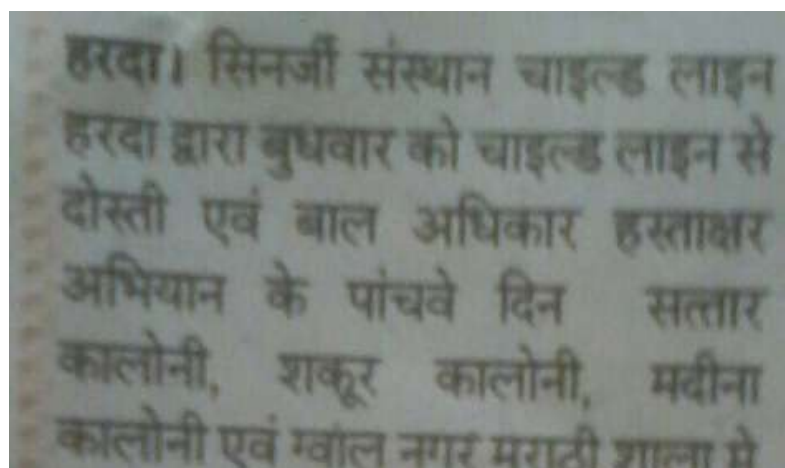

LEGACY NATIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAMME

Legacy National Education Programme was partnered by Synergy from January-March 2016 with a view to improving access to education for marginalized children in Bhopal and Rajgarh districts of Madhya Pradesh.

OBJECTIVES

- To provide support to young people from poor and excluded communities to complete university education
- To support government elementary schools to provide quality, non-discriminatory and universal education
- To strengthen school governance systems in target schools
- To reduce the number of children participating in child labor and increase ex-child laborer enrolment and retention rates in elementary schools in the target areas

LEGACY NATIONAL EDUCATION PROGRAMME

The slum is an unorganized slum setup since 20 years with approximately 800 households with inmates majorly comprising of Muslims and unprivileged backward groups indulging into occupation on daily wage basis. The children of the inmates are involved into child labour and other petty works for contributing in the financial aspects of their families. Due to the unavailability of schools and lack of proper education facilities most of the children especially girls have never gone to schools.

Due to frequent dropout and absenteeism of the children it was assessed and found that the school was at distant location i.e 3Kms away and according to the RTE guidelines it should be accessible within 1Km range. With frequent interventions and efforts the primary school running in private building of New Subash Nagar has been successfully relocated to Ravidas Colony which will be further shift to Arjun Nagar Maida Mill on the Government approved land. The head master Ms.Azarha Sultan with continuous efforts and in support of the community approached the Government departments requesting the relocation of the school to the safe place close to the communities which is easily accessible to the children. However the efforts went ineffective due to the lack of attention and interest from the Government officials.

When the Legacy programme started in the community the team initially formed an SMC (School Management Committee) and with the help of this committee strongly approached to the Vidhayak, Parshad, DEO and other government officials in order to successfully get the school shifted to Ravidas colony which would be further relocated to Arjun Nagar Maida Mill to the government approved land where a new school will be constructed at the earliest whose budget has already been sanctioned.

Since the budget for the school construction has been sanctioned the team is looking forward for the immediate start of the construction work so that the children can avail proper infrastructure and education facilities at the door step.

UDAAN FELLOWSHIP



Udaan is a year-long fellowship for young girls. The focus of our work is for the participants to be strongly rooted in knowledge & understanding of their own selves, their strengths & weaknesses, their rights, their values, their culture and their environment.

Having thus taken the initial steps of self-transformation, we then encourage participants to expand their circle of influence and develop ideas for impacting their communities as well. This process of self-discovery and leadership development helps them to learn how to enjoy life and eventually builds local role models of transformation. This is the 'Strengthening Roots, Spreading Wings' approach of the Udaan Fellowship.

Through multiple touch points like workshops, peer groups & mentoring, we enable the participants to truly see how gender socialization pervades their daily lives and encourage them to challenge some of the social norms which may be holding them back.

MANJU DHAK

Manju recently completed her Post Graduate Diploma in Rural Development (PGDRD) from IGNOU. Her own experience of gender discrimination, when she was duped into getting married, has informed the way she perceives independence. Manju is working with tribal women (age group of 18-35) of Devigad Village (Jhabua), who are forced to migrate in order to fulfill the financial needs of their families. Manju is trying to prevent this migration from happening in the first place by developing access to different avenues for livelihood. To start with, she created a list of women who are likely to migrate this season, followed by organizing them into groups. She is trying to explore different livelihoods options for these groups and connecting the groups with different government run entrepreneurial schemes such as sewing-stitching training; organic farming training; cottage industry training etc. These women are also finding a space through these groups to discuss various social and personal issues of their own on which they might also take action such as dowry, and domestic violence.

RADHIKA



Radhika belongs to Rahatgaon village of Harda district. She is associated with the youth resource center in Rahatgon run by Synergy Sansthan for the last one year. She realized that in the past one year she had broken lots of identity-related stereotypes, which gave her the confidence to undertake the Udaan fellowship. Through the Udaan fellowship she wanted to restart her own education and also work for drop out girl's



MAMTA

Mamta has fought great odds throughout her growing up years for her access to livelihood and education. A self defence trainer herself, Mamta has a brown belt in Karate. She has setup a centre where girls come and learn the art of self defence through karate, as well as have a space to share their issues and learn self-reliance. This space fosters a positive atmosphere and helps boost the confidence among young women. Mamta is also trying to create livelihood options for these women through her skill in bamboo jewellery making.

SAFE CITY PROGRAMME



Safe city initiative is a community-based effort to make the city free of violence against women. The program aims at allowing women and girls freedom of movement in public spaces without the fear of harassment. UN Women's Global Flagship Initiative, 'Safe Cities and Safe Public Spaces' builds on its 'Safe Cities Free of Violence against Women and Girls' global program, with leading women's organizations in slums through support organizations.

It is a unique initiative of Synergy Sansthan along with UN Women aimed at preventing sexual violence in urban public spaces, through strategic alliances with communities and local service providers, empowering women and girls.

An important element under this program is the formation of 'Shourya Dal', a group comprising of men and women from within the community forming a club with the objective of creating a women-friendly environment in the society to facilitate economic empowerment. The Dal functions on the principle of community partnerships for curbing violence against women and for the expeditious resolution of such cases.

Darpan means Mirror in Hindi. In this programme we facilitate healthy conversations about changing bodies of adolescent boys and girls so that they are body positive. The aim is to have a open dialogue with the group so that they can learn and understand what are the changes their bodies are going through. Girls are especially sensitized on menstruation - the safe practises to be followed during it, the biological reason for it and how to take care of themselves during those days.

CHILD LABOUR WORKSHOP



In 11 cases an employers have been charged with fine and amount given to children engaged in labor work under CLPRA Act. Dialogues with family and panchayat, vigilance committee and ICPS committees are continuously going on for follow ups of the children. The reprisal of these legal actions in the area can be seen as many children have been transferred to other place and it becomes difficult to trace them. It might be possible that they have been shifted to more detrimental situation. Hence, we are in continuously dialogue with family along with responsible district administration for rehabilitation of children for their positive development

Dialogue with Commissioner, Labour Department and ex-members of State Child Rights Protection Commission has been done for development of SOPs for CBL. This year we will put emphasis on SOPs development.

State level Orientation and consultation was organised with active participation of around 50 representatives from CWC, JJB, SJPU, ICPS, Anti Trafficking cell and civil society members. The experience and data along with gaps and challenges were shared in the consultation. The detailed advocacy plan was developed at the end. The discussion on use of JJ act and BL act to address the issue was also done.

CHILD LABOUR WORKSHOP



A ten days long awareness campaign on CBL has been carried out in 40 villages of Harda and Khandwa district. This campaign helped in spreading awareness about Child rights and CBL. Different communication mediums such as street play, focused group discussion, public meetings, meetings with panchayat representatives were used to impart information on CBL,

Public Hearing on RTE and CBL: State Public Hearing was organised to share Child Bonded Labor cases to the government. Commissioner labor Department along with Labor Officer was present in the hearing. After listening to the cases the commissioner accepted the existence of BL in the area and assured action to address the issue. We also recommended for the development of SOPs for CBL cases. Regular dialogue is continue with department for state specific SOPs.

STORY OF MUKESH

Mukesh, son of Gangaram Gond belonged a family of bonded labourers. Their family comprised of 4 members. Their family had taken a loan to build a small house but his father was unable to find meaningful employment. To repay the debt taken by them to construct the house; Mukesh started working a labourer at Mr Gajanand Patel's place who was paid 1 quintal of wheat as his salary and had to work for 12 hours everyday.

Hi day used to start at 6am when he milked the buffaloes and took them out for grazing. He would then look after them till 12,30 and head to farm to deliver lunch to the farmers. At 2pm he would take the buffaloes back to the village for grazing and look after them till 9pm. He would eat his meals just once a day and worked with his schedule for 2 years. He would also help in cutting and transporting the grains during the harvest season.

in 2014, the organisations started sensitising people in 8 villages in Harda district against child labour. During one such sessions, Mukesh came up front and registered for his case to be considered. Their petition was submitted to the Zilla Panchayat officials and later to the Human Rights Commission. HRC directed the government to officially investigate the issue.

On 15 April 2015, the official investigating team from government side directed Mr Gajanand Patel to pay minimum wage to Mukesh for his labour. They did not recognise his as a child labourer. At the moment he is living with his parents.

Before I used to be scared of keeping my view, but now I speak it and is also being understood. Before I used to feel unsafe while coming out of the house, but now I have confidence and also support from the family and I can go out anywhere.

The Changelooms programme is a platform through which young people can understand & express themselves. The programme helps them build their leadership skills and understanding of child rights & social inclusion, as well as strengthen their on-ground work on child rights, through learning workshops, individual mentoring, networking and advocacy.

Over the one-year period of the programme, we select and identify 15 inspiring young social change leaders (between age group - 18 -30 years), to be a part of a year-long journey of transformation – the young people will work towards transforming the world around them, while letting their experiences of doing so transform them in the process.

To strengthen youth-led change initiatives to promote and pioneer innovative and creative projects that work towards child rights. To incubate leaderships of “Changeloomers” and enable them to create an impact on the ground, and identifying models that can be replicated

Child Groups

In 12 slums in Harda district we have created groups for children aged 8-16 where each group has 12-16 children. These children collectively work towards developing a friendly atmosphere in the slum. They teach their contemporaries of the child rights and also encourage others to participate in the activities conducted by the organisation. They also identify children who do not go to schools and encourage their parents to send them to schools. These children educate others about Right To Education and are always vigilant towards the happenings in the locality.

STORIES FROM THE FIELD



Village Transformation

Small village of Jatrapadaav in Harda district has seen transformation in terms improved status of women and children in the village. It is dominantly a tribal village and women in the village undertake small projects like weaving baskets, brooms and men craft musical instruments. It is also very susceptible to flooding due the presence of Ajanol river. Most of children in the village had dropped out of school and were doing small jobs. They were also getting attracted to substance abuse and alcohol.

Our programmes there focused on creating awareness among the villagers about child rights, importance of education, and right to education. The children in the village have started going to school and are leading the way to other behavioural change in the village.
