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Introduction

The United Nations' Youth 2030 Strategy emphasizes the importance of meaningful youth participation in policymaking and decision-making. It envisions a world where young people's rights are upheld and their full potential is realized as leaders and changemakers. In India, states like Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Maharashtra, and Rajasthan- home to more than 52% of the country's youth (Youth in India, 2022)- must be prioritized to realize this vision. Yet, youth in these regions continue to face layered challenges such as unemployment, gender inequality, mental health concerns, environmental crises, and the socio-economic impacts of rapid urbanization and digitization.


Addressing these issues requires a paradigm shift, where youth must not be seen merely as beneficiaries of development but as active co-creators of change. With the right platforms, partnerships, and resources, they can lead transformative action, rooted in their communities. This raises crucial questions: How can youth participation move beyond tokenism? How can cross-sectoral partnerships expand youth leadership? And how can young people be better equipped to shape the systems that define their future?

It is in this spirit that Synergy Sansthan launched the "Yuva Aagaaz, Yuva Awaaz" conference in 2024, a state-level platform to elevate youth voices and leadership in Madhya Pradesh. The inaugural edition brought together over 250 tribal, rural, and marginalized youth alongside institutional stakeholders to co-develop a shared agenda for youth development rooted in local realities. The event underscored the power of participatory, youth-led processes in shaping policy and practice, while highlighting critical issues such as gender justice, skill development, and youth-centered planning.

Building on this foundation, the 2025 edition of the conference- under the theme “Youth Power Reimagined: From the Margins to the Mainstream”- seeks to deepen its impact by co-creating a forward-looking Youth Agenda 2025-2030. In preparation, Synergy Sansthan facilitated pre-conference youth consultations across multiple districts, creating a platform for diverse young voices to share their challenges, aspirations, and ideas for change. These consultations have laid the groundwork for the conference, ensuring that discussions and outcomes reflect the lived realities of youth across Madhya Pradesh.






The Youth Consultations and its Objectives

The objectives


- To gather the diverse perspectives of youth from varied social, educational, linguistic, gender, and religious backgrounds.

- To document youth reflections through short videos and written ideas, contributing to the shaping of a collective Youth Agenda 2030.

Unveiling the Youth Agenda 2030



Geographic Coverage and Youth Context of Pre-Conference Consultations

- Conducted across six regional clusters of Madhya Pradesh.
- These clusters together covered more than 40 districts.
- Ensuring representation from diverse geographies—tribal belts, agrarian regions, urban centers, and industrial areas.
- Each cluster reflects unique socio-economic contexts.

The following section briefly outlines the geographic spread of each cluster and the major youth development challenges that emerged from these regions

Harda Cluster (Harda, Khandwa, Sehore, Khategaon, Burhanpur)

This region is largely agrarian, with farming and small-scale labour as the main sources of livelihood. Youth here face challenges of limited higher education opportunities, especially in rural pockets, leading to high migration for work and studies. Skill training facilities are scarce, and employment options are often restricted to agriculture or informal sectors. Girls face additional barriers in mobility and access to education due to social norms. Burhanpur and Khandwa, being border districts, also experience cultural diversity but lack adequate youth platforms for civic and leadership engagement.

Ujjain Cluster (Ujjain, Neemuch, Mandsaur, Ratlam, Shajapur, Agar Malwa, Rajgarh)

The Ujjain region has a strong cultural and religious identity, with Ujjain city serving as a historic hub. However, youth in the adjoining districts face challenges linked to agriculture dependency, limited skill-building avenues, and substance abuse issues, particularly in Neemuch and Mandsaur due to the opium belt. Education infrastructure exists but quality remains uneven, especially in rural and semi-urban areas. Gender norms limit participation of young women in higher education and public life. Despite these challenges, the region has a vibrant youth population eager to explore leadership opportunities.

Vidisha Cluster (Vidisha, Bhopal, Guna, Raisen, Ashoknagar, Sagar)

This cluster combines Madhya Pradesh's capital, Bhopal, with semi-urban and rural districts. Bhopal offers better access to education, jobs, and civic spaces, but youth from nearby districts like Vidisha, Raisen, and Ashoknagar face gaps in quality education, employability skills, and exposure. Youth in Guna and Sagar also encounter issues of unemployment and lack of livelihood diversification, pushing many into migration. Social inequalities-caste, class, and gender remain significant barriers for youth participation. The cluster, however, has strong student and civil society networks that can be tapped for youth development.

Gwalior Cluster (Gwalior, Bhind, Morena, Shivpuri, Datia, Tikamgarh, Niwari)

The Gwalior region has a mix of urban centers and rural hinterlands. Youth in this cluster often face challenges of unemployment, early marriage, and political exploitation, particularly in districts like Bhind and Morena. Shivpuri, Datia, and Niwari struggle with education gaps, especially for young women. Migration to nearby cities for jobs is common, but opportunities are often informal and insecure. Despite these hurdles, Gwalior city has active student groups and institutions that provide some pathways for leadership and civic participation.


Jabalpur Cluster (Jabalpur, Katni, Damoh, Narsinghpur, Mandla, Dindori, Anuppur, Balaghat)

This cluster covers a mix of industrial, agrarian, and tribal districts. Jabalpur city offers educational and employment opportunities, but tribal districts like Mandla, Dindori, and Balaghat face persistent challenges of poverty, malnutrition, and poor access to quality schooling. Digital divide and lack of skill-building institutions further isolate rural youth. Migration to larger cities is high, with many working in precarious, low-paying jobs. Gender inequalities, especially in tribal areas, limit young women's agency. However, the region has strong community-based traditions that can be leveraged for youth leadership.

Satna Cluster (Satna, Panna, Chhatarpur, Rewa, Sidhi, Singrauli, Shahdol, Umaria)

The Satna cluster represents Bundelkhand and Vindhya regions, marked by economic backwardness and ecological challenges like drought. Youth here grapple with limited livelihood opportunities, high out-migration, and inadequate higher education institutions. Mining and industrial belts in Singrauli and Umaria provide some jobs, but mostly informal and unsafe. Early marriage, child labor, and lack of awareness about rights continue to restrict youth, especially girls. Despite this, cultural pride and resilience are strong in the region, with young people showing interest in community-led initiatives when given platforms.

Youth Development Challenges Across Madhya Pradesh Clusters



Youth Voices from Across Madhya Pradesh

These consultations across districts brought together diverse young voices. Each cluster revealed its own unique challenges-ranging from limited access to education and livelihood opportunities, to gender-based restrictions, migration pressures, and lack of safe spaces for expression. Despite these differences, a strong thread of common realities connected the voices of young people across Madhya Pradesh.


What emerged powerfully was the resilience and determination of youth. While they openly spoke about the hardships they face in their districts, they also shared bold aspirations for change—seeking equal opportunities, meaningful participation in governance, and inclusive platforms where their voices matter. The consultations not only highlighted the pressing issues but also showed that young people, if given the right support, can drive social transformation in their communities and beyond.

Key Concerns Raised by Youth

- **Unemployment and Migration**-- Young people feel forced to migrate to cities due to lack of local jobs, often ending up in low-paying, insecure work. Many expressed frustrations at not finding dignified opportunities near home.
- **Education Gaps**--Youth highlighted poor infrastructure and quality in government colleges, lack of career guidance, and limited vocational training. They feel education is not preparing them for the future.

- **Gender Inequality & Restrictions**-- Girls face restrictions on mobility, pressure for early marriage, and limited participation in sports or leadership roles. They want equal freedom and recognition of their potential.
- **Mental Health Struggles**-- Stress, insecurity, and depression are rising, with no safe platforms to openly discuss mental health. Youth feel judged and unsupported when they try to share their struggles.
- **Addiction and Social Media Misuse**-- Substance use and excessive social media are harming health, focus, and relationships. Youth worry about losing valuable time and want healthier alternatives for engagement.
- **Discrimination and Social Barriers**-- Caste-based exclusion, stigma against LGBTQI+ youth, and unequal treatment continue to affect confidence and opportunities. Many shared that this limits their participation in society.
- **Limited Civic Engagement**-- Young people feel their voices are ignored in governance. Schemes and policies often don't reach them, leaving them disconnected from decision-making processes.
- **Lack of Safe Spaces**-- There are very few open, inclusive, and non-judgmental spaces for youth to express themselves, discuss issues, or build confidence. They want more platforms for dialogue and creativity.
- **Climate Change Awareness**-- Raising awareness and building youth-led action on environmental issues and the climate crisis was seen as urgent.
- **Values, Rights, and Laws**-- Youth need accessible, clear information about their rights, laws, and social values to strengthen civic participation.

Towards an Empowered Youth Agenda

The concerns raised in the consultations were not only about problems but also about possibilities. Across districts, young people expressed a strong desire to move beyond barriers and shape a future rooted in equality, dignity, and opportunity. Their aspirations reflected both immediate needs and long-term visions for change.

- **Safe and Open Spaces--** Youth want inclusive spaces where they can gather, learn, and express themselves without fear or judgment. These spaces are seen as essential for building confidence and leadership.
- **Equal Opportunities--**They strongly demand equal access to education, sports, and leadership roles, regardless of gender, caste, or background. They envision a society where all talents are valued.
- **Employment & Entrepreneurship--** Youth aspire for skill-based training, livelihood opportunities, and support for startups. Many expressed interest in entrepreneurship if proper guidance and mentorship are provided.
- **Mental Health Support--**They want counseling centers, awareness campaigns, and peer support systems to normalize conversations on mental health and reduce stigma.
- **Youth in Governance--** Young people want meaningful inclusion in decision-making bodies at local and state levels. They believe their fresh perspectives can help address issues directly impacting them


- **Bridging Gaps**--Youth demand better collaboration between government, NGOs, and communities so that resources and opportunities can reach them more effectively.
- **Social Change**--They aspire for a society free from caste discrimination, gender bias, and harmful practices like child marriage. Youth see themselves as changemakers for equality and justice.
- **Technology as a Tool**--Instead of only being a source of distraction, youth want digital platforms to be used for awareness, skill-building, and amplifying voices on social issues.

Youth Aspirations and Demands




Challenges on the Ground for Youth-led Organisations

Many young leaders from grassroots youth-led organizations, as well as those running community-based groups, actively participated in the panel discussions. They shared their lived realities of building and sustaining organizations at the local level often with very limited resources but immense determination. These conversations created a space to reflect on the challenges they encounter in sustaining their work, while also exploring practical ways to adapt, grow, and strengthen grassroots youth-led efforts.



Building Resilient Youth Organizations



- **Funding and Structural Barriers--** Panelists emphasized that one of the biggest challenges for youth-led NGOs is securing funds. Donors often demand well-structured proposals, detailed reports, and long organizational track records, which young organizations typically lack. Inadequate program design, incomplete documentation, and absence of official registration further limit their eligibility for funding. This directly affects their ability to establish office spaces, hire staff, and sustain core activities.
- **Local Politics--** Discussions highlighted that local-level politics frequently interferes with youth work. NGOs that do not align with particular leaders or groups face delays in permissions and reduced community support. Moreover, political actors often view young people primarily as vote banks rather than as partners in development, sidelining youth interests in decision-making processes.
- **Lack of Mentorship and Guidance--** Another recurring concern was the absence of structured mentorship opportunities. Young founders often lack access to guidance on organizational management, legal compliances, and networking. Without such support, they rely on trial-and-error approaches, which consume time and energy and slow down organizational growth.
- **Limited Visibility and Recognition--** Youth-led organizations also struggle with visibility beyond their immediate communities. Larger or more established NGOs tend to receive greater attention and recognition, leaving smaller initiatives overshadowed. This lack of visibility undermines their credibility and makes it difficult to attract funders or partners.

- **Volunteer Retention and Burnout--** Retaining volunteers was identified as a persistent challenge. Many youth-led NGOs initially depend on friends and peers for volunteer support, but sustaining long-term engagement becomes difficult due to the absence of financial incentives or career pathways. Leaders themselves often face burnout while trying to balance studies, work, and social engagement.
- **Gender and Social Barriers--** The panel also pointed to deep-rooted gender and social barriers. Young women leaders reported facing skepticism about their abilities, while cultural restrictions limited their scope to lead effectively. Additionally, caste and class-based divides created further barriers for many youth attempting to organize and lead community initiatives.
- **Technology and Skills Gap--** Participants also highlighted the digital divide as a major obstacle. Donors and partners increasingly expect advanced communication, documentation, and reporting systems. However, many grassroots youth organizations lack access to the necessary training, digital tools, or reliable internet connectivity. This gap reduces their competitiveness compared to larger organizations with better resources.

Conclusion

The youth Consultations of 2025 highlighted both the struggles and the strengths of young people across Madhya Pradesh. They demonstrated that youth are not just the leaders of tomorrow but changemakers of today. With meaningful support, inclusion in governance, and access to equal opportunities, young people have the power to drive sustainable social transformation for the state and the country.

The insights compiled through these processes will serve as a knowledge base and guiding framework for the State Youth Conference, ensuring that the voices of young people remain central to the dialogue on youth leadership, social change, and civic engagement.
